



In the *deserts*, people travelled in large caravans to protect themselves from *dacoits*. Abdul Qadir's mother send him with such a caravan because he was too young to travel alone.



When he was leaving, his mother gave him a *waistcoat* to wear and said, "My son, I have *sewn up* forty gold coins into the lining of this waistcoat. I think you'll need money in Baghdad; take care of it, and remember, never tell lies, always speak the truth."

Boy Abdul Qadir was standing aside, watching the incident calmly. Just then, the chief of the dacoits noticed him. He came to the boy, saying, "I don't think you have some money with you because you look so poor. Anyways, have you got any gold with you?"

"Yes, I have got forty gold coins with me," said the boy.



The dacoits searched his pockets, but they could find none. The chief said in a **threatening** voice, "You're telling lies to fool us."

At this the boy said, "No, I am not telling lies. The gold coins are very much there inside my waistcoat." Saying this, Abdul Qadir tore, open his waistcoat and the gold coins lay scattered all over.

The chief of the dacoits was amazed at the little boy's truthfulness and courage. He said to the boy, "When we ourselves did not find anything with you, then why did you tell us the secret of your gold coins?"

Little Abdul Qadir answered, "My mother told me not to tell lies when I left her. How could I disobey her?"

The chief was greatly moved by these words. He felt sorry and said to this **fellow** dacoits, "This little boy obeys his mother so much that he did not tell lies even in the face of danger. On the other hand, we neither obey God nor follow his teachings.

Shame on us. This boy has taught us a lesson today."

Then the chief asked his men to return all that they had looted from the merchants. Also, he and other dacoits promised to lead a righteous life. Thus, little Abdul Qadir's truthfulness saved himself and others from the dacoits.

Dhum-dhum! The boy sat up in bed.

The sky had grown lighter.

From the distant bazaar came a new music, many drums and voice, faint but steady,

growing in rhythm and excitement. The sound conveyed something that belonged to his dream world, and on a sudden impulse he sprang out of bed.

He went to the door and listened—the house was quiet, he bolted the door.

The colours of Holi, he knew, would stain his clothes, so he did not remove his pyjmas. In a old pair of flattened rubber-soled tennis shoes, he climbed out of the window and

ran over the dew-wet grass, down the path and behind the house, over the hill and into the jungle.

When Rahul saw the boy approach, he rose from the ground. The long hand drum, the dholak, hung at his waist. As he rose, the sun rose. But the sun did not look as fiery as

Rahul who, in Bunty's eyes, appeared as a painted demon, rather than as a god.

"You are late, mister," said Rahul.

"I thought you were not coming."

He had both his fists closed, but when he walked towards Bunty he opened them, smiling widely, a white smile in a green face. In his right hand was the red dust and in his left hand the green dust. And with his right hand he rubbed the red dust on Bunty's left cheek, and then with the other hand he put the green dust on the boy's right cheek; and then he stood back and looked at Rusty and laughed. Then, according to custom, he **embraced** the bewildered boy.

"Come," said Rahul, "Let us go and make the town a rainbow."

Children formed groups. They were armed mainly with bicycle pumps, or pumps fashioned from bamboo stems, from which was squirted liquid colour.

And the children paraded the main road, chanting **shrilly** and clapping their hands. The men and women preferred the dust to the water.

Rahul was met by some friends and greeted with great hilarity. A bicycle pump was directed at Bunty and a jet of sooty black water squirted into his face.

Blinded for a moment, Bunty blundered about in great confusion.

Then *his eyes cleared*. He blinked and looked wildly round at the group of boys and girls who cheered and danced in front of him.

Then, one by one, Rahul's friends approached Bunty. Gently, they rubbed dust on the boy's cheeks, and embraced him. Rusty could not distinguish one from the other. But this gently greeting coming so soon after the stormy bicycle pump attack, bewildered Bunty even more.

Rahul said: "Now you are one of us. Come," and Bunty roamed the town and countryside with Rahul and his friends.

For one day, Ranbir and his friends forget their homes and work and the problem of the next meal, and danced down the roads, out of the town and into the forest. And for one day, Bunty forget his guardian and the *missionary's* wife and ran with the others through the town and into the forest.





A BUSINESS DEAL


In a small Italian town, hundreds of years ago, a small business owner owed a large sum of money to a loan-shark. The loan-shark was a very old, unattractive looking guy that

While he was picking them up, the daughter noticed that he'd picked up two black φ pebbles and placed them both into the bag.


He then asked the daughter to reach into the bag and pick one.


After a month, the Father Wolf pushed "Mowgli, the frog," as they called him, into the centre of the Pack's meeting.

get into trouble? But wasn't Neha in **trouble** because of her?


The next morning, Sudha reached






